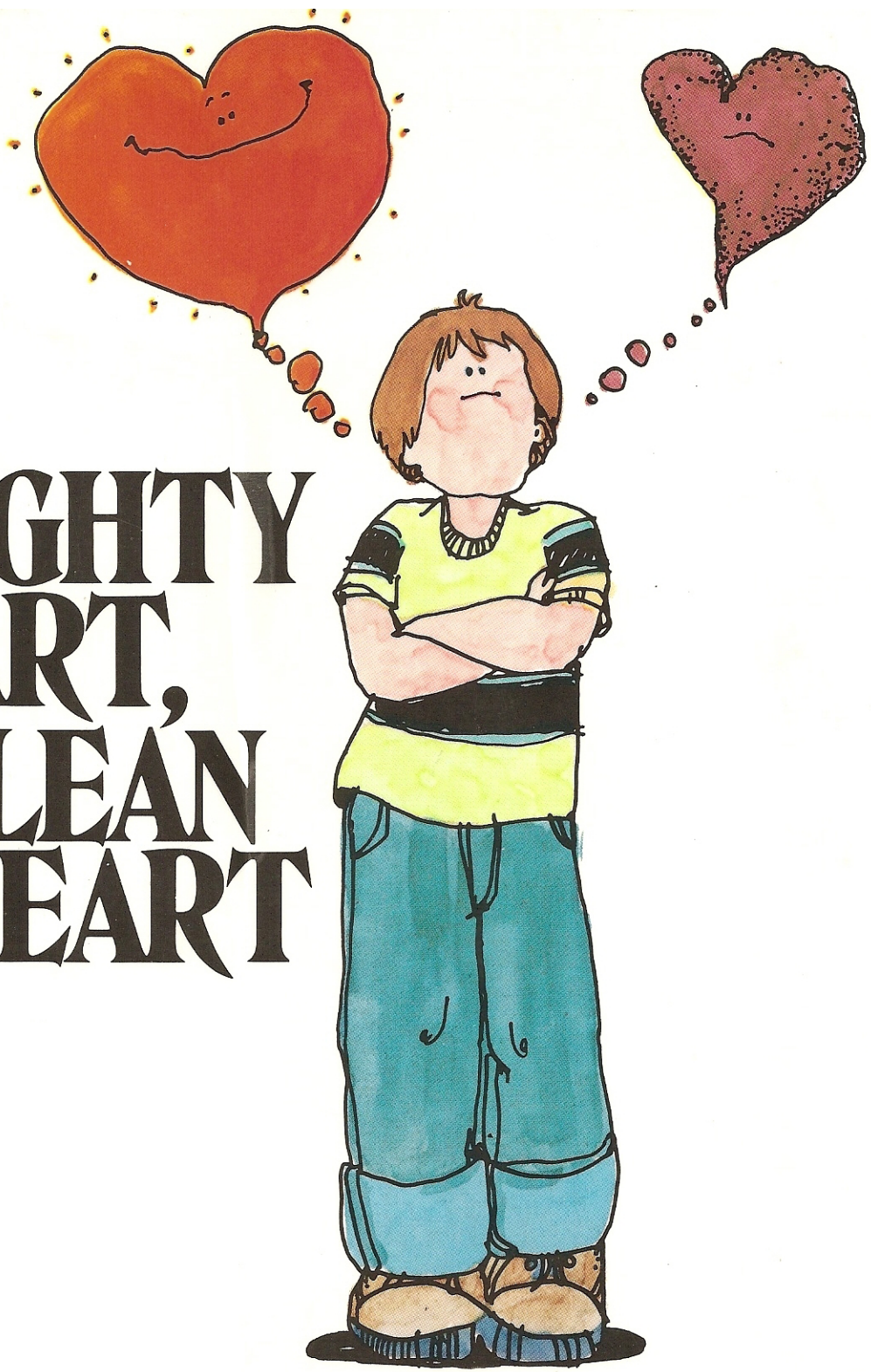
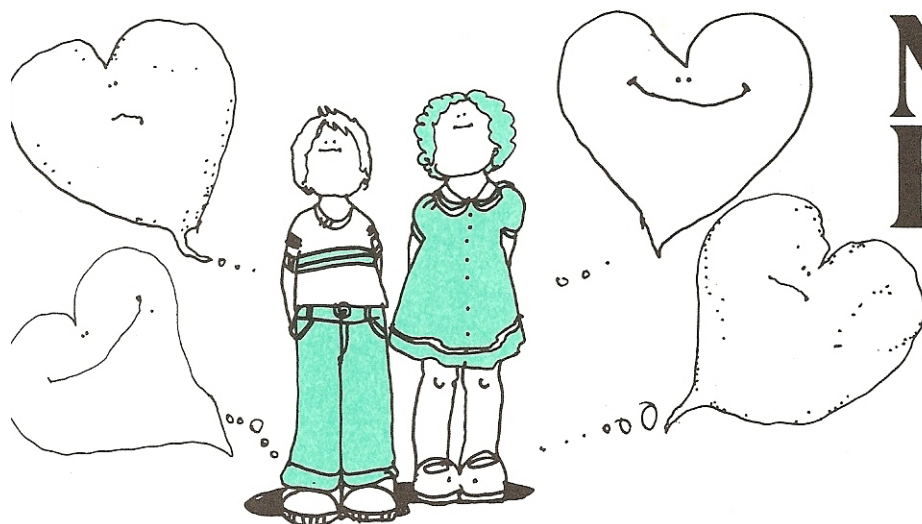

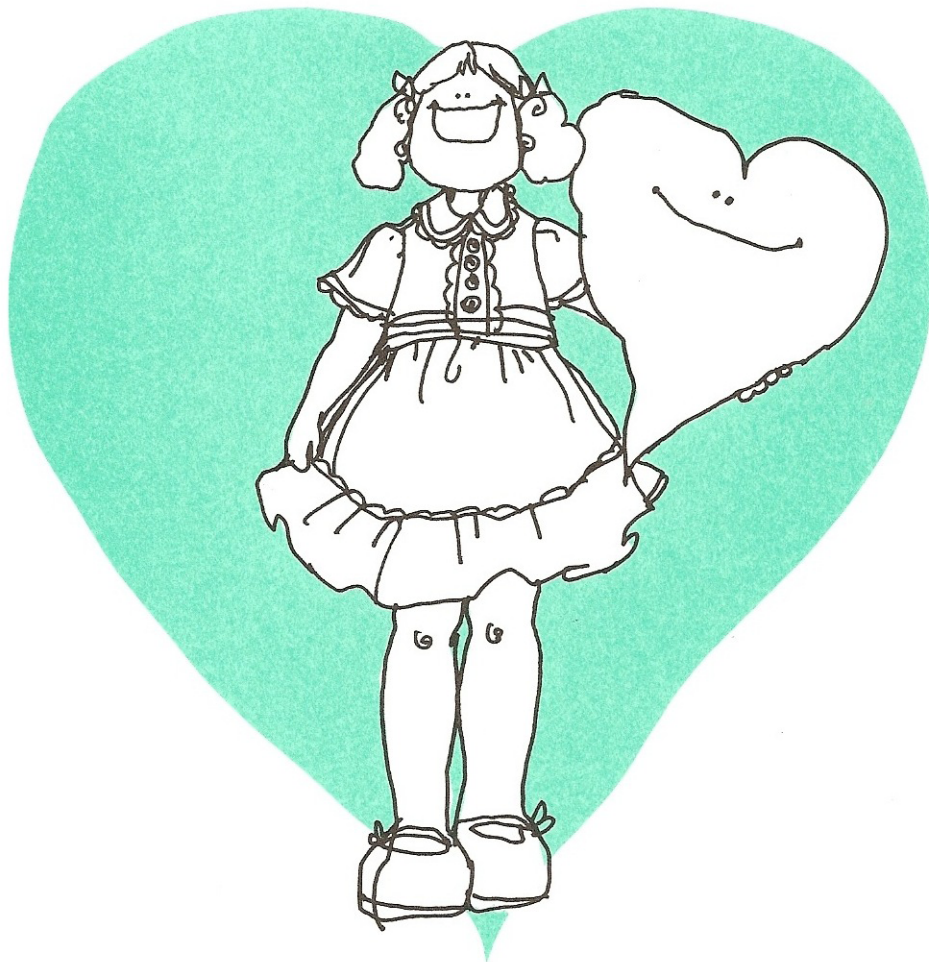

FOR GROWNUPS

As you read *Naughty Heart, Clean Heart* to your child, keep in mind that small children need small doses—perhaps a chapter should be repeated several times before going on to the next. It is possible for little tots to understand righteousness by faith. In Testimonies, volume 1, page 400, we read, “Parents should explain and simplify the plan of salvation to their children that their young minds may comprehend it. . . . Do not teach your children with reference to some future period when they shall be old enough to repent and believe the truth. If properly instructed, very young children may have correct views of their state as sinners and of the way of salvation through Christ.”

This story, in a slightly modified form, has been presented to many children in Sabbath school and Vacation Bible School. The results confirm the statement by Ellen White quoted above. The Holy Spirit works with us whenever we present the plan of salvation. It is a moving experience to see the light dawn in children’s eyes as they begin to comprehend. More thrilling still is the actual living relationship they may have with Jesus. I’d like to share with you some of their comments.

A 6-year-old boy to his mother, who is worried over a problem: “You shouldn’t

worry, Mamma. The main thing is to have a clean heart. Then everything comes out OK.”

A 4-year-old girl: “I’m happy all the time ‘cause Jesus gives me a happy heart!”

A 6-year-old boy: “I ask Jesus every morning for a clean heart. That’s why I’m so good in Sabbath school!”

A 6-year-old boy to his mother: “I am trying to decide whether I really want a clean heart.” He was under the weather for about two weeks, deciding. Then one day he ran in from play and said, “Mother! I finally decided! I’m going to be Jesus’ boy!”

I was particularly impressed that these little children, who were unfamiliar with 1 John 3:24—“And hereby we know that he abideth in us, by the Spirit which he hath given us”—still knew that principle experientially. And notice who gets the credit for the good results!

My prayer is that the Holy Spirit may breathe understanding into the hearts of all our little children. And if there be any virtue in this booklet, I’d like to follow the example of the little ones and give Him all the credit.

The following quotation from *Steps to Christ* and the texts below are used in the manuscript either as quotes, paraphrases,

or as a basis for the material presented.

"Because of his [Adam's] sin our natures are fallen and we cannot make ourselves righteous. Since we are sinful, unholy, we cannot perfectly obey the holy law. We have no righteousness of our own with which to meet the claims of the law of God. But Christ has made a way of escape for us. He lived on earth amid trials and temptations such as we have to meet. He lived a sinless life. He died for us, and now He offers to take our sins and give us His righteousness. If you give yourself to Him, and accept Him as your Saviour, then, sinful as your life may have been, for His sake you are accounted righteous. Christ's character stands in place of your character, and you are accepted before God just as if you had not sinned.

"More than this, Christ changes the heart. He abides in your heart by faith. You are to maintain this connection with Christ by faith and the continual surrender of your will to Him; and so long as you do this, He will work in you to will and to do according to His good pleasure. So you may say, 'The life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me.' . . . Then with Christ working in you, you will manifest the same spirit and do the same good works—works of righteousness, obedience.

"So we have nothing in ourselves of which to boast. . . . Our only ground of hope is in the righteousness of Christ imputed to us, and in that wrought by His Spirit working in and through us."—Pages 62, 63.

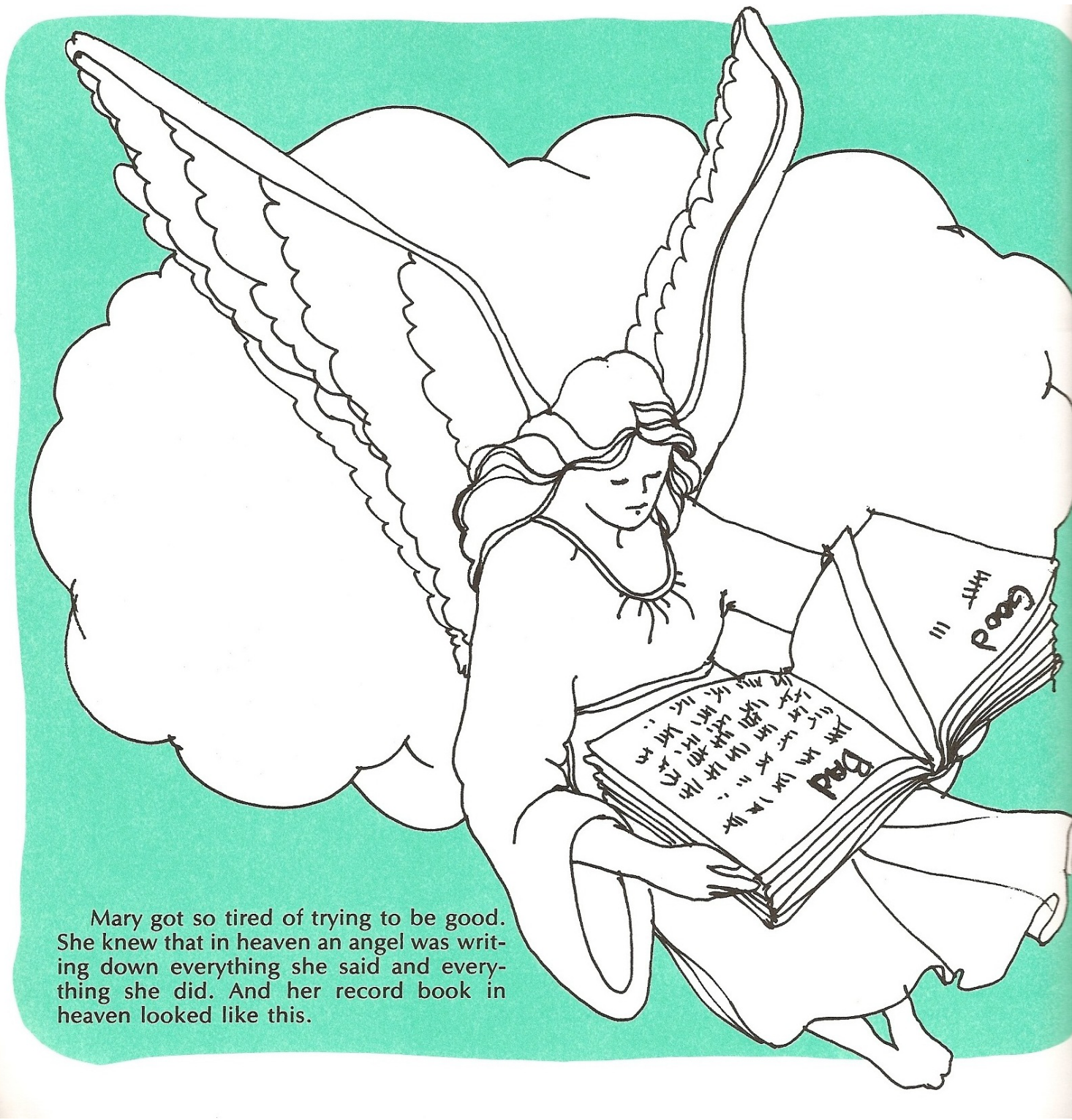

problem. The harder Mary tried to be good, the worse she got! Her heart looked like this. And it seemed there wasn't a thing she could do about it.



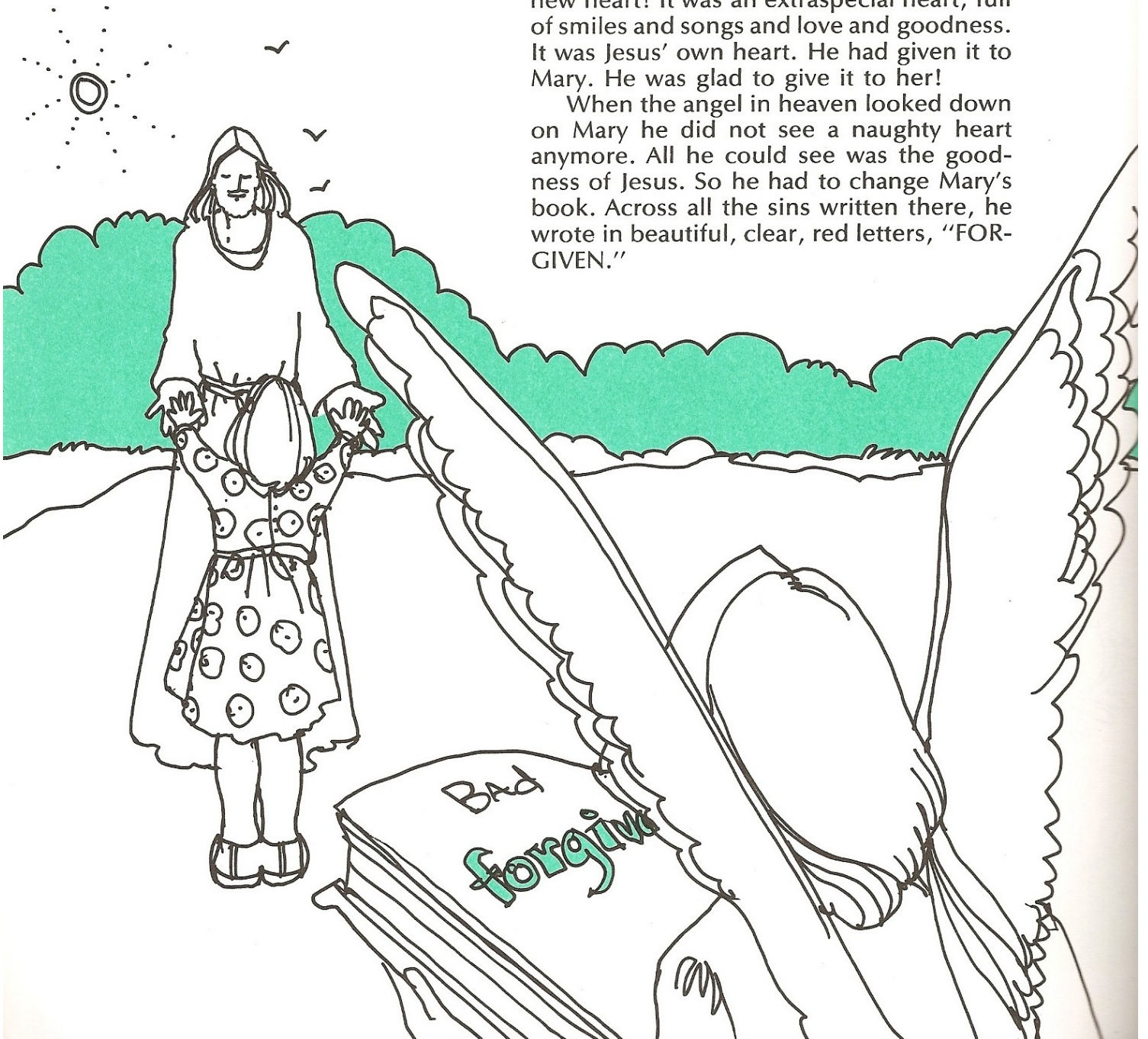
Mary got so tired of trying to be good. She knew that in heaven an angel was writing down everything she said and everything she did. And her record book in heaven looked like this.

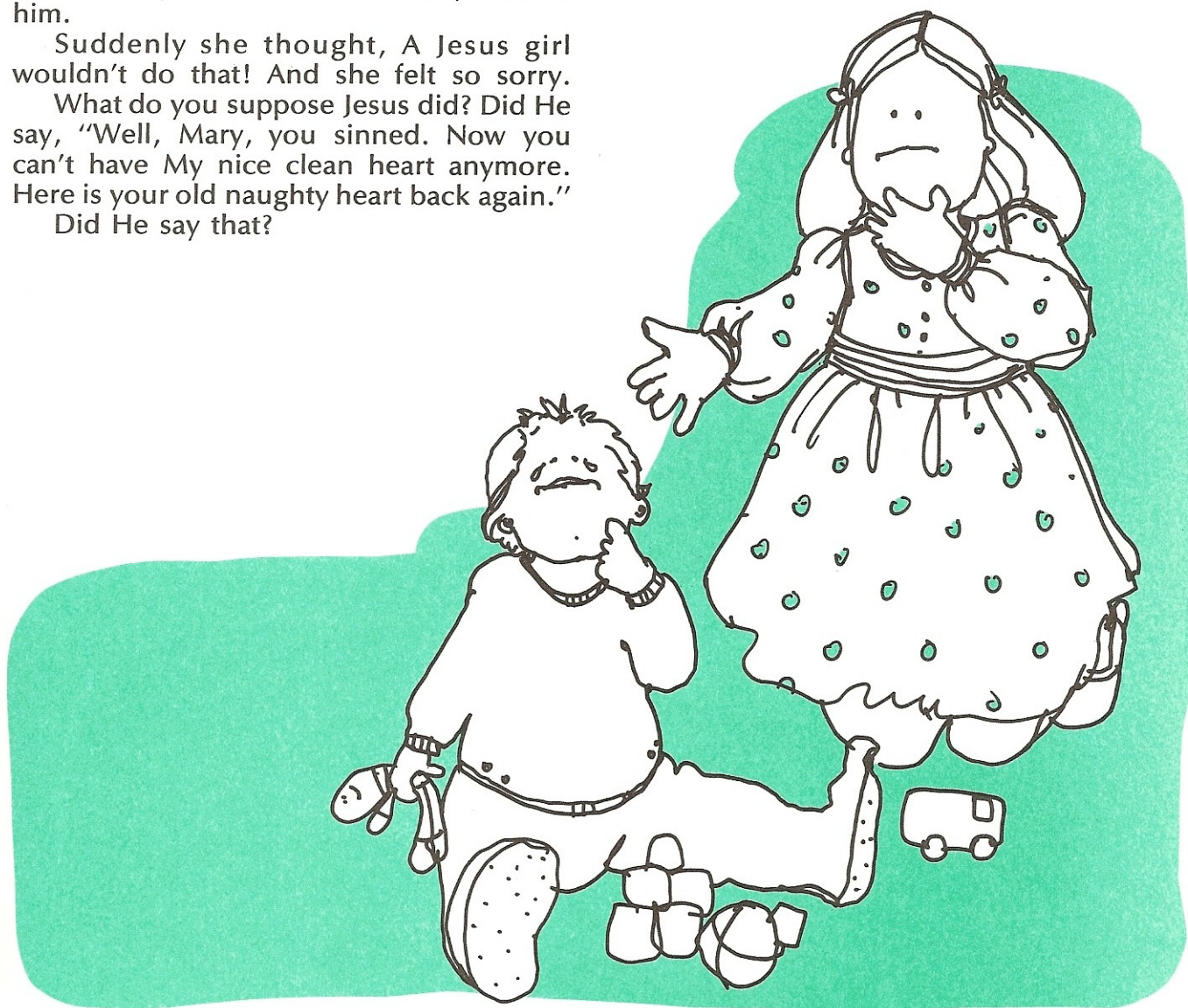
He listened to Mary's prayers every morning and every evening when she asked Him to help her keep her new heart. She didn't ever want her naughty heart back again.

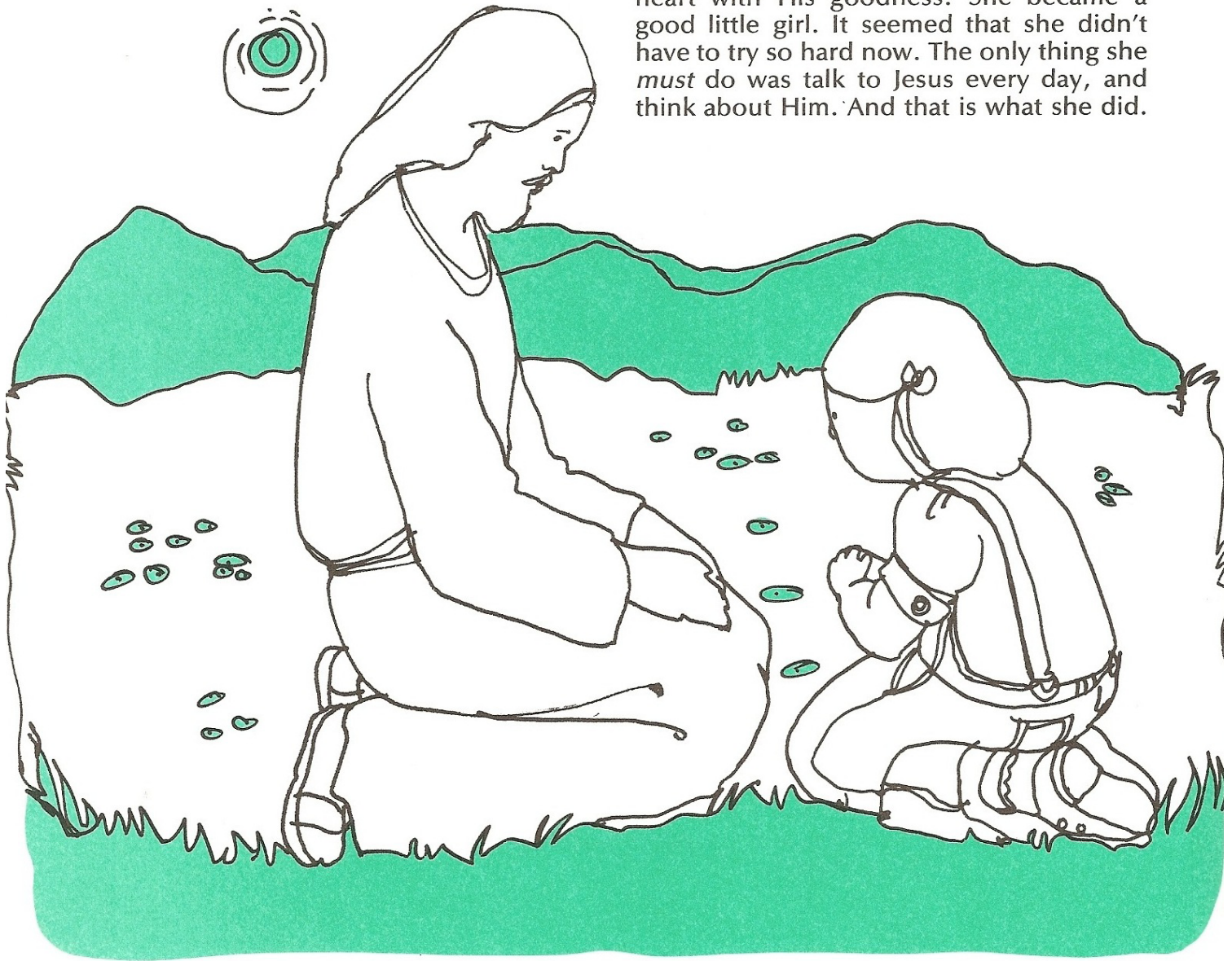

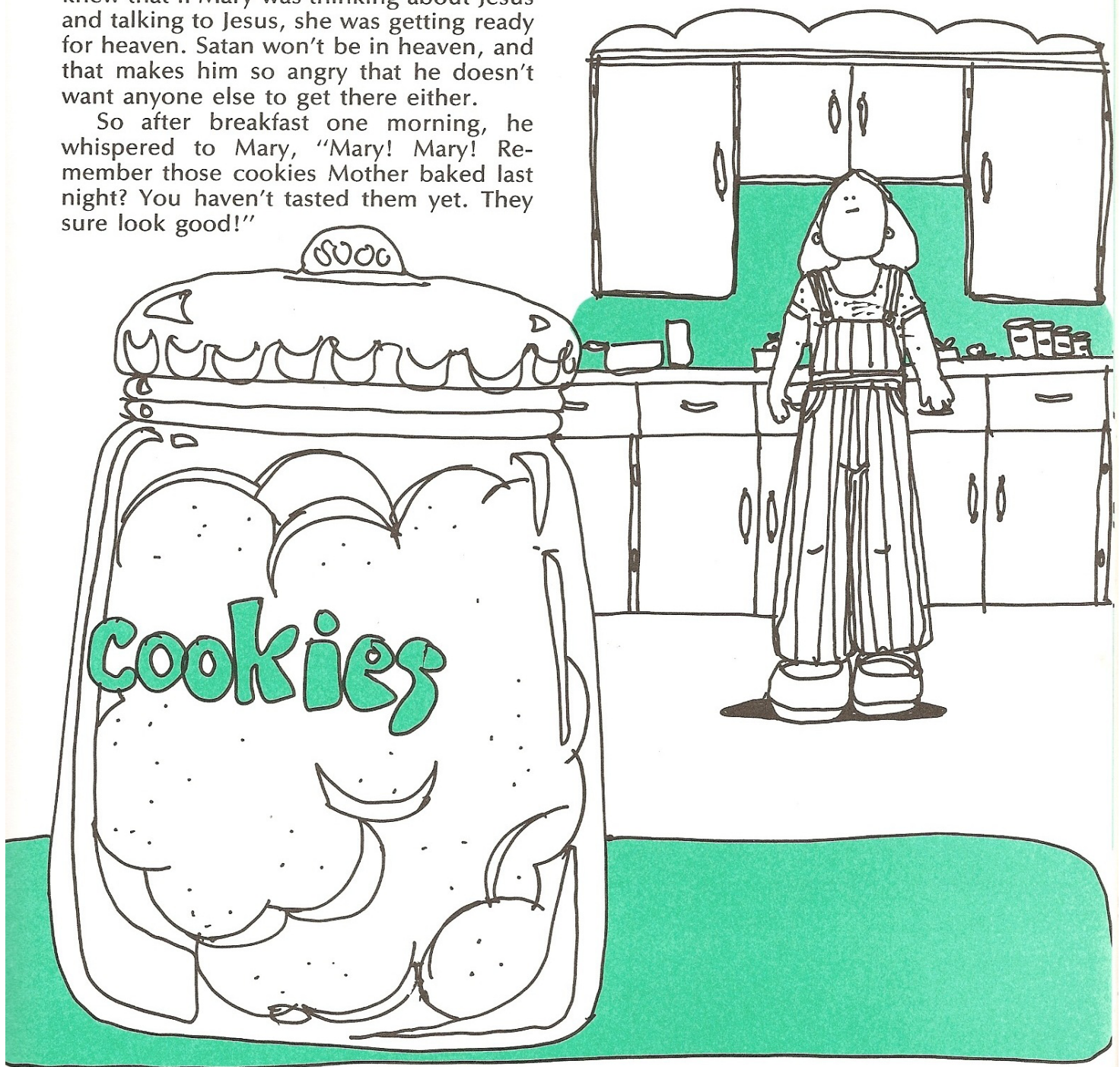
MARY AND THE COOKY JAR

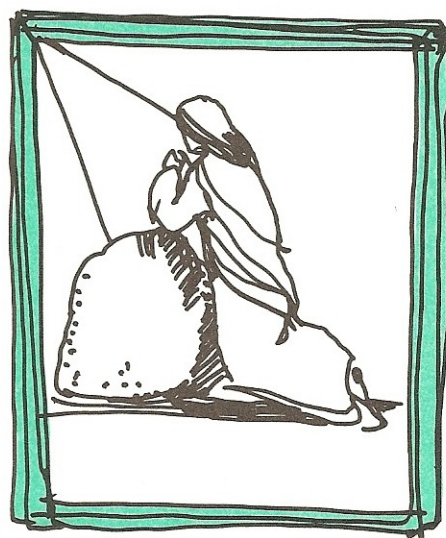

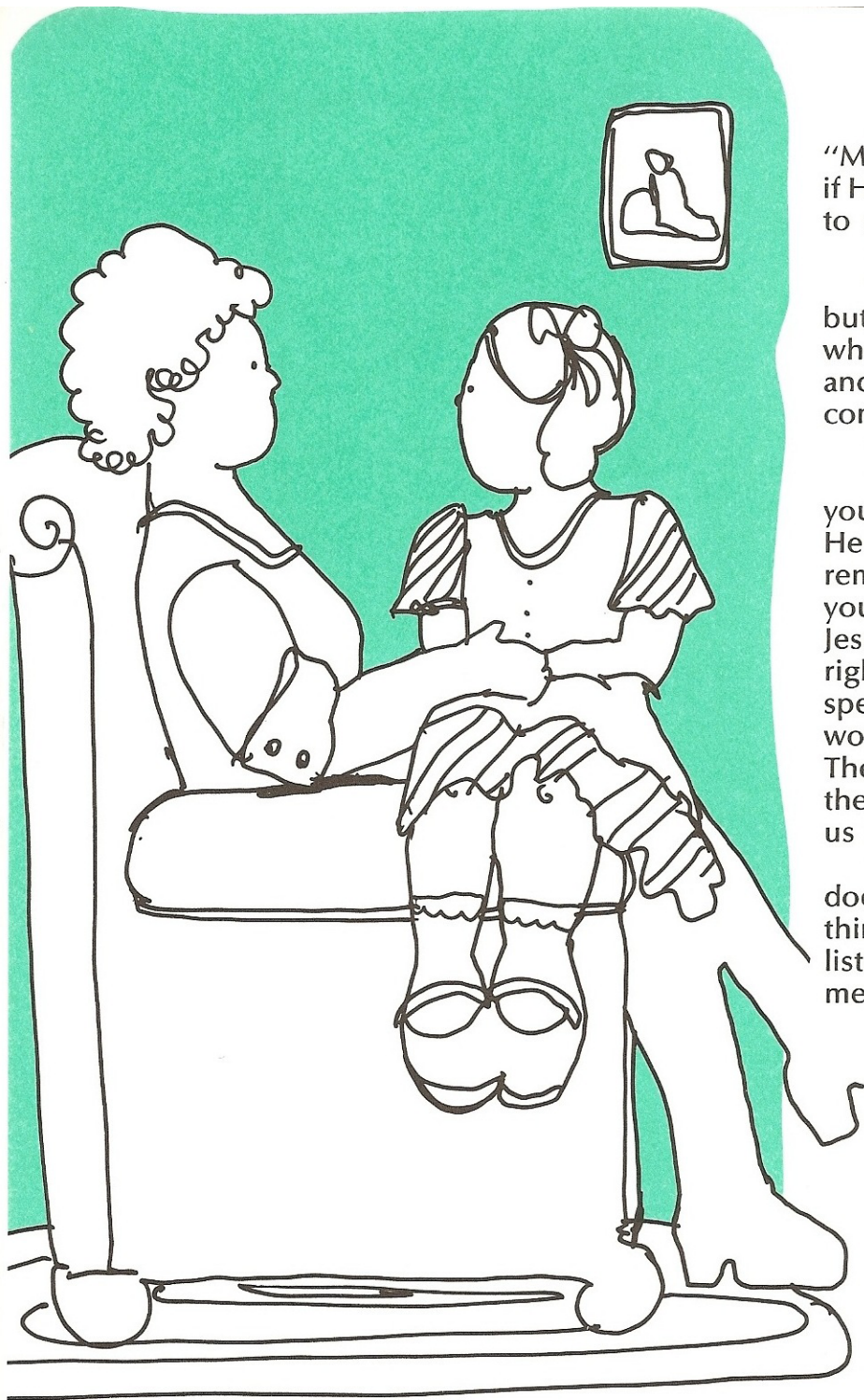


HOW JESUS TALKS TO MARY

Mary went to Mother and asked, "Mother, why doesn't Jesus talk to me if He is my friend? My other friends talk to me, but He doesn't."

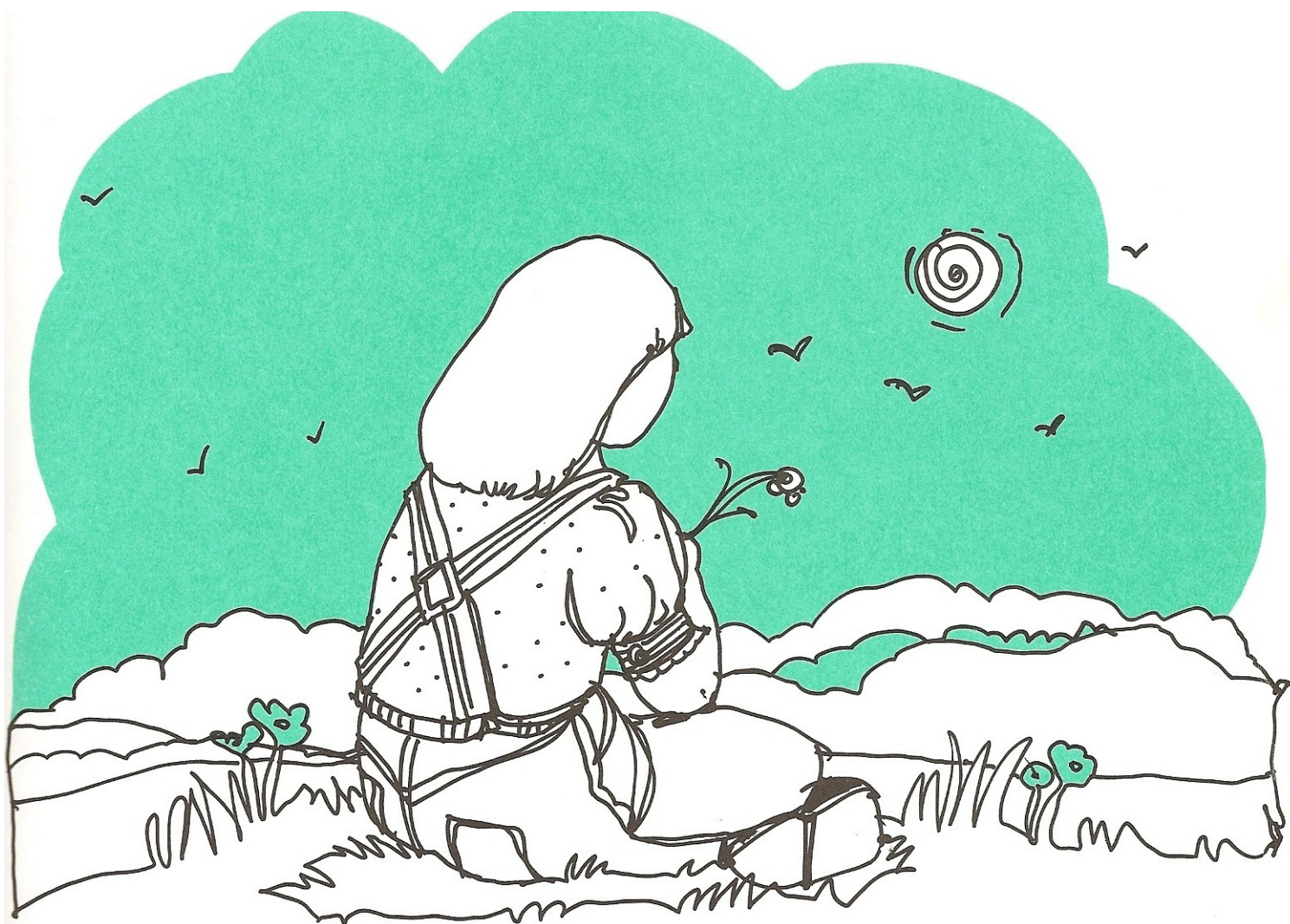
Mother smiled.

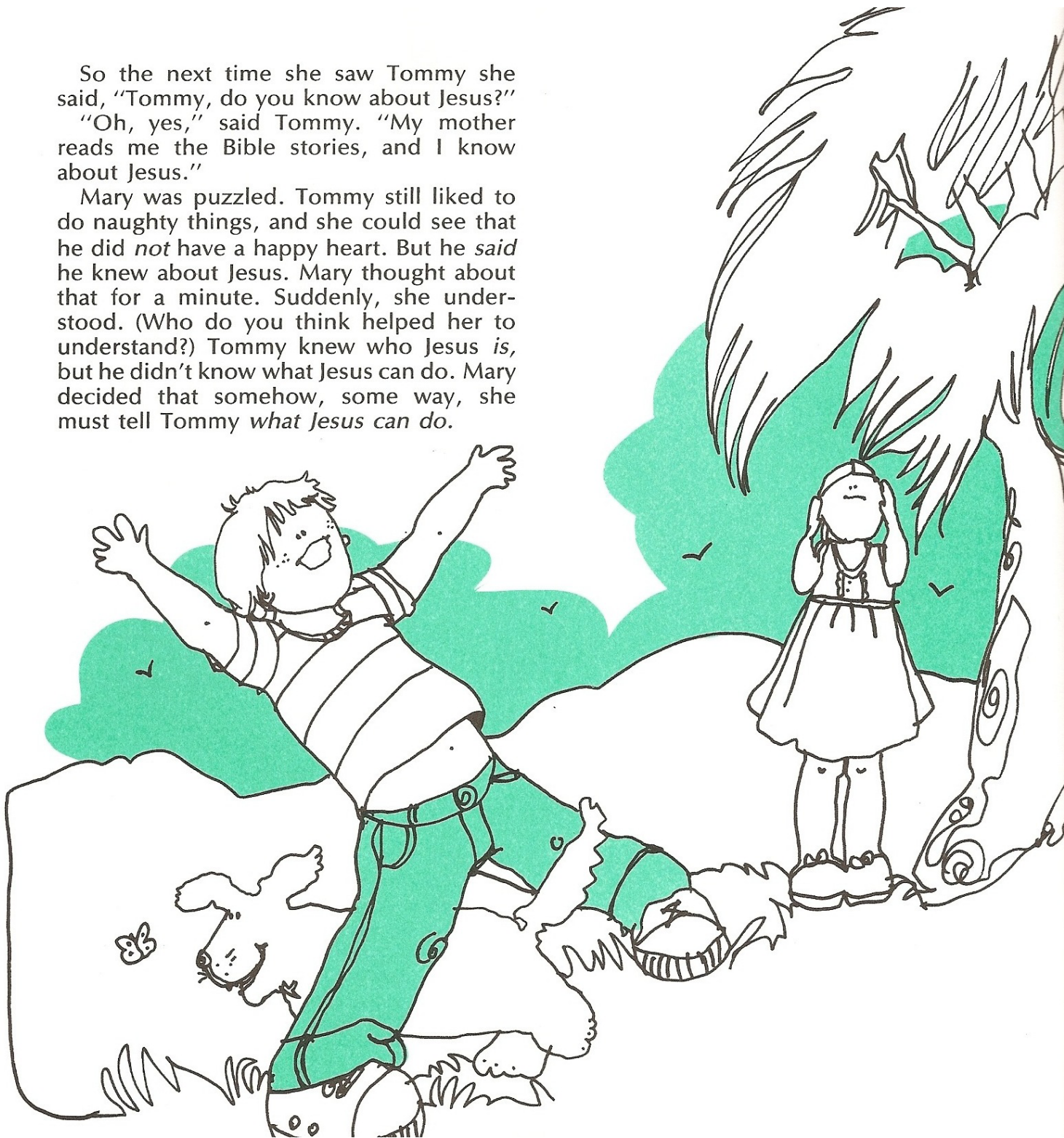
Next door to Mary lived a boy named Tommy. He was just about your size. And he was Mary's friend. But when Mary saw Tommy do naughty things she felt sad.

"Well, if you want to, I guess. Go ahead." And Tommy settled comfortably on the grass in the shade of the weeping willow tree.



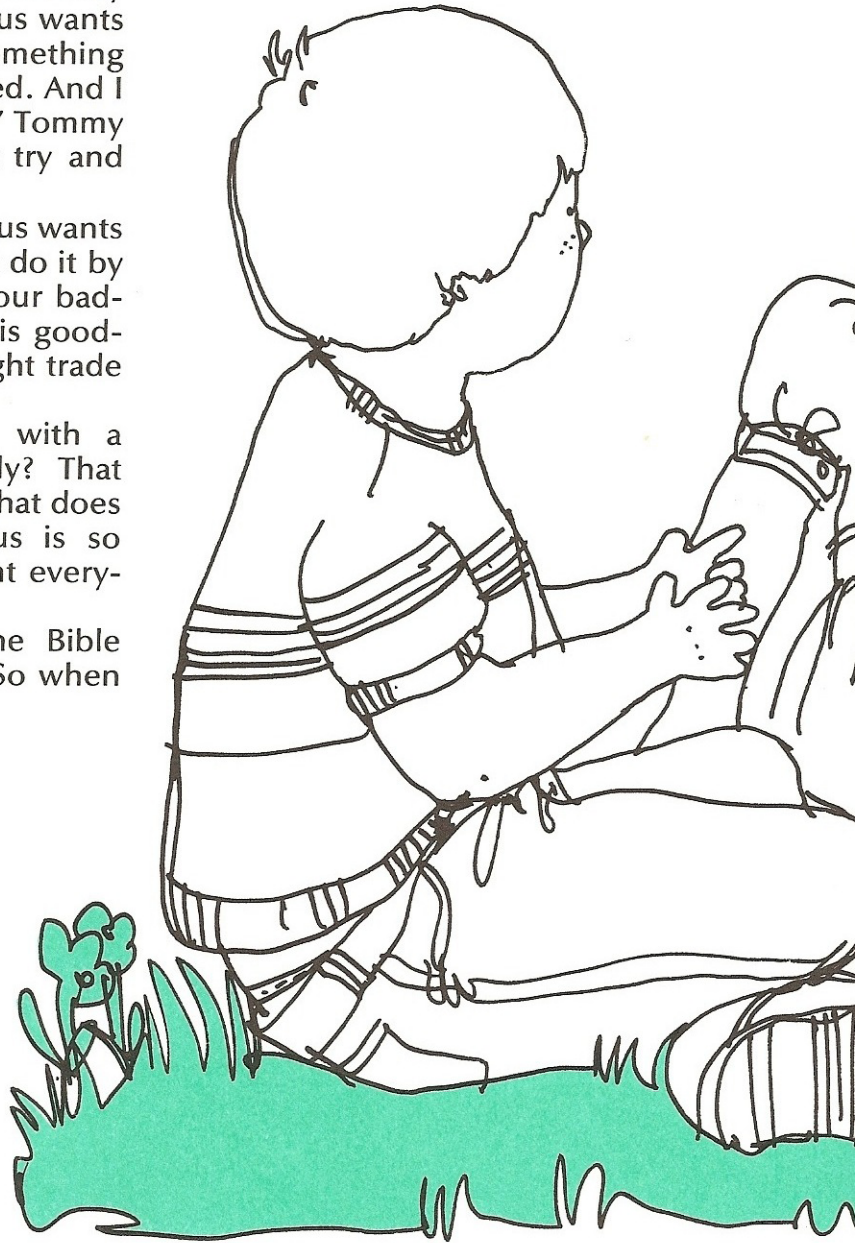
"Tommy, isn't it awfully hard to be good?"

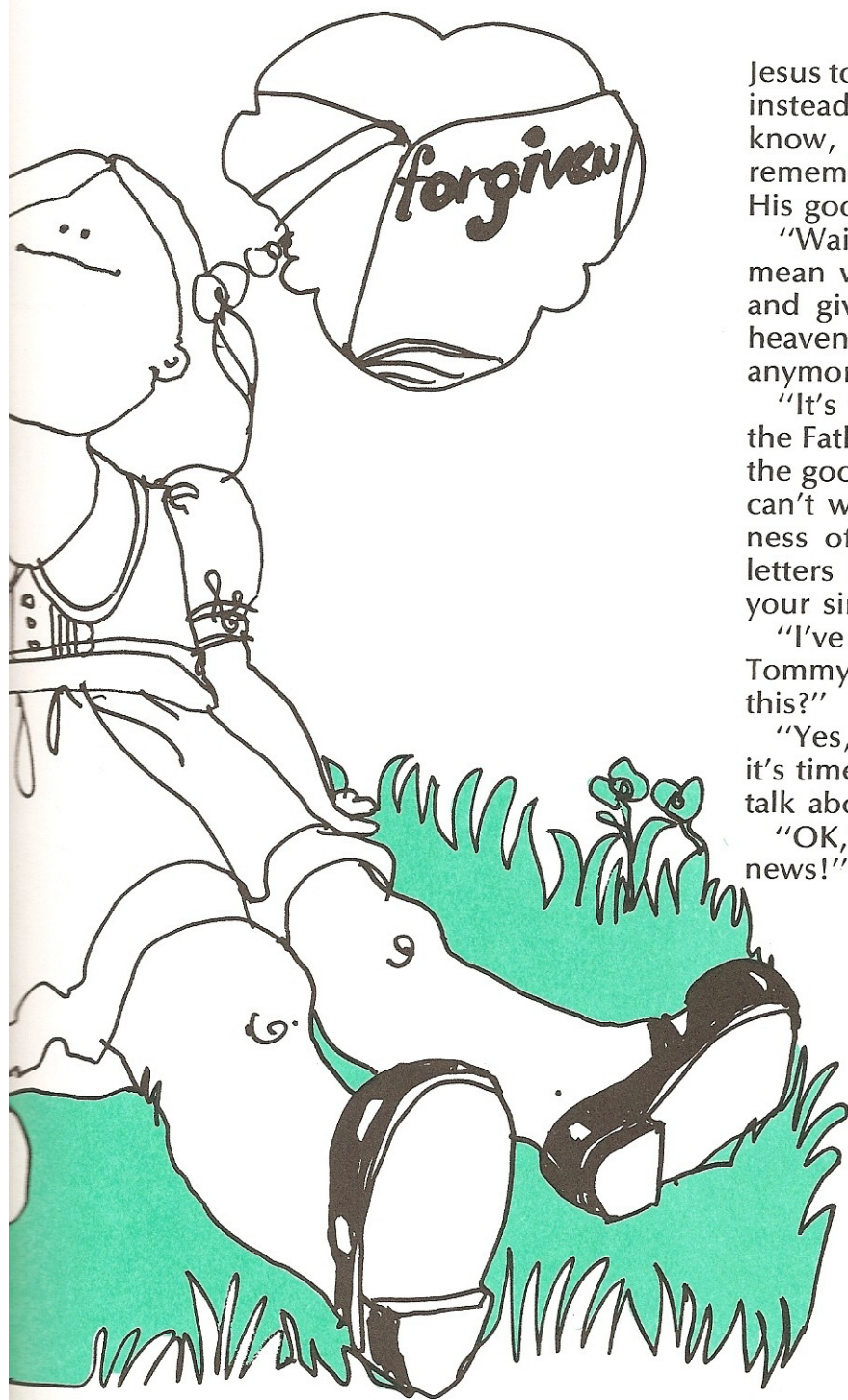

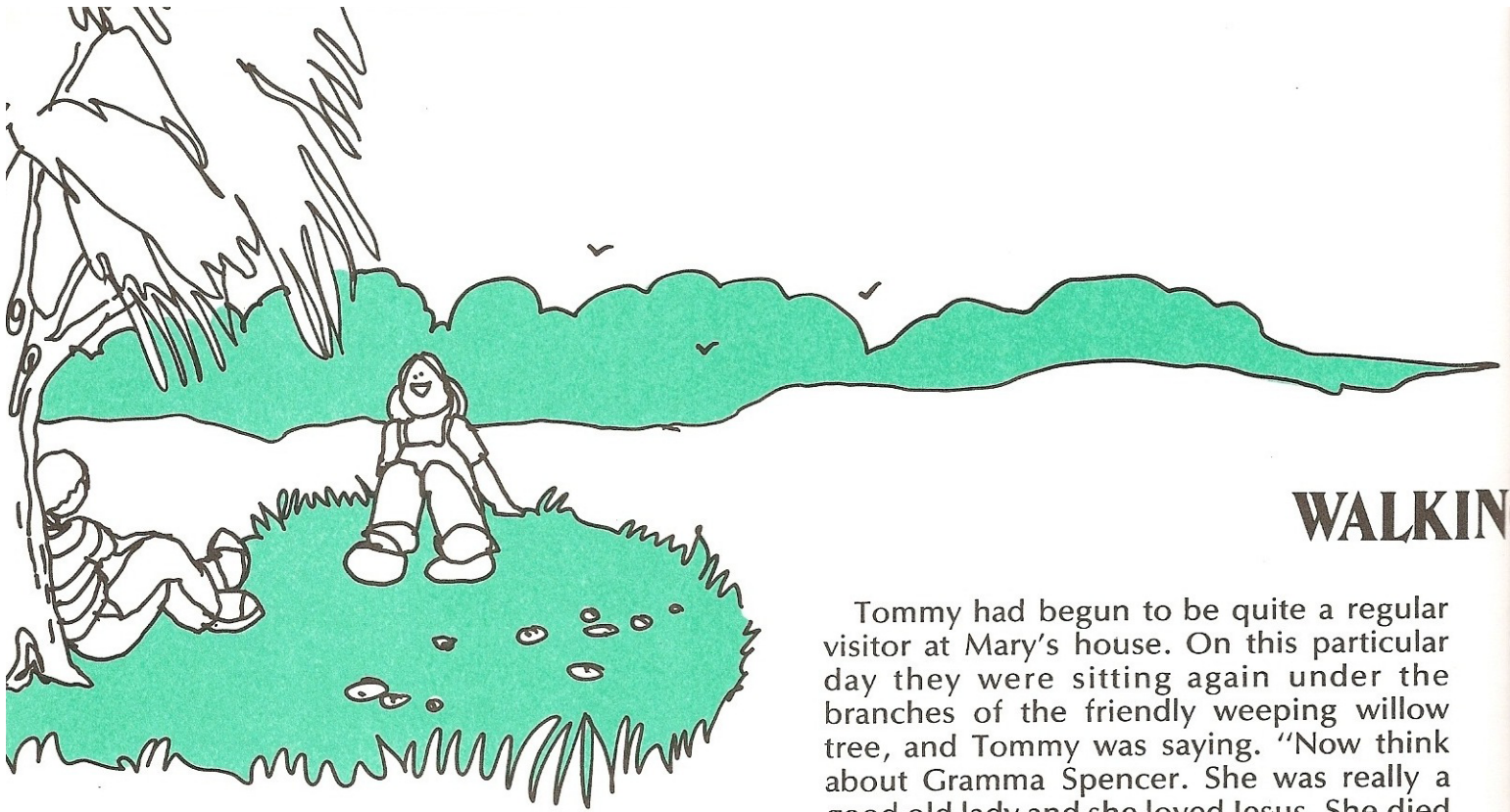

"But you said if we have a clean heart we wouldn't do wrong," said Tommy, puzzled.

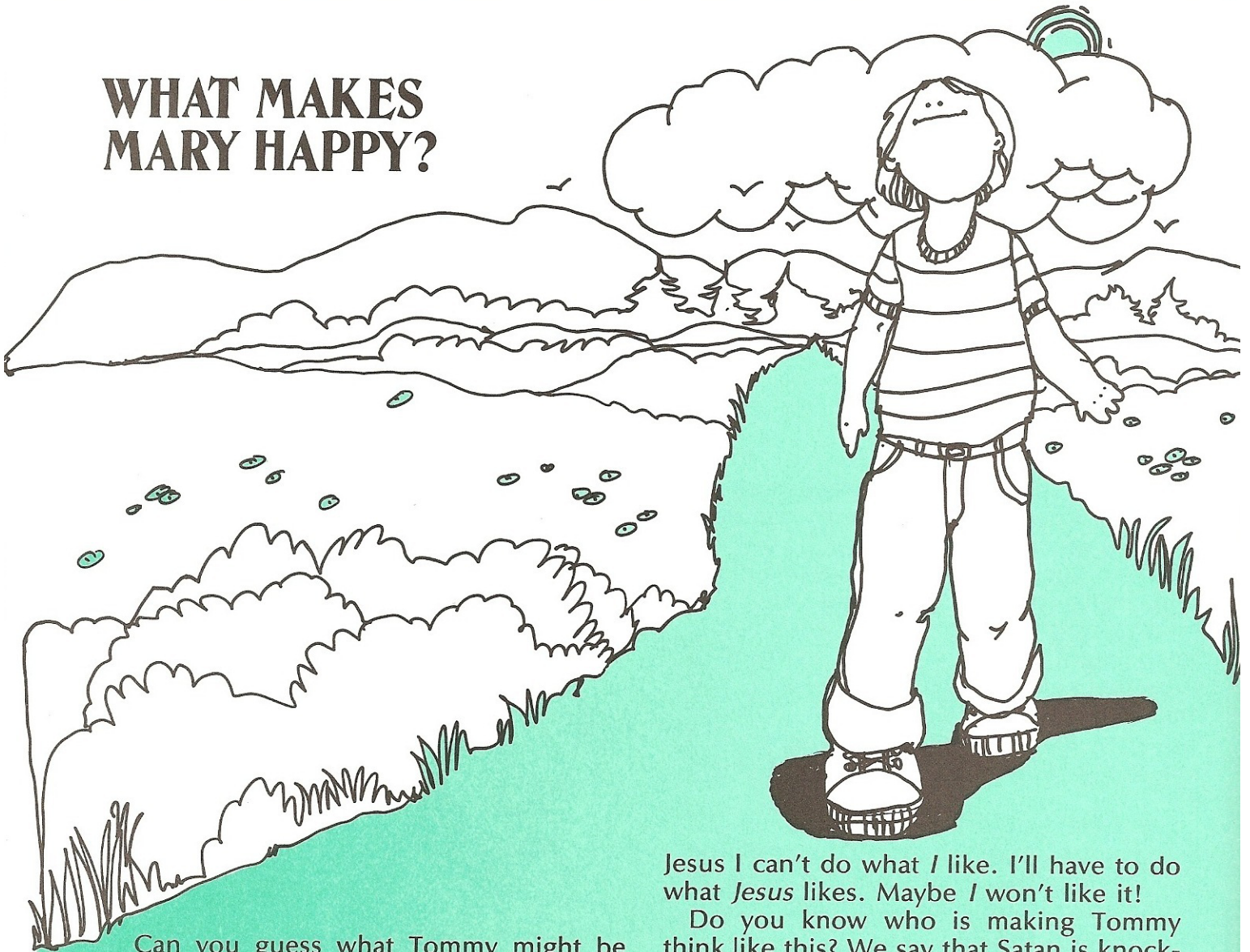

TOMMY DOES SOME THINKING

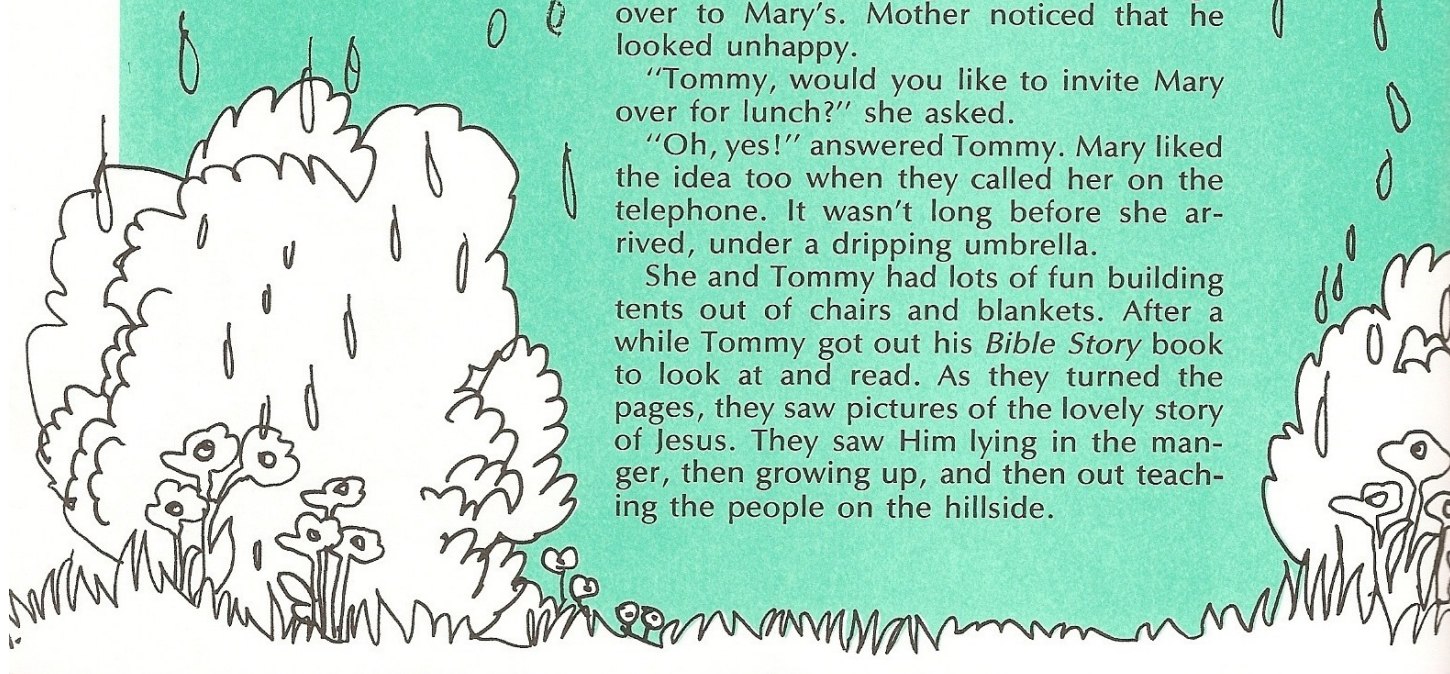


Tommy frowned as he looked out the window. It was raining and he couldn't go over to Mary's. Mother noticed that he looked unhappy.

"That seems so sad," said Tommy.

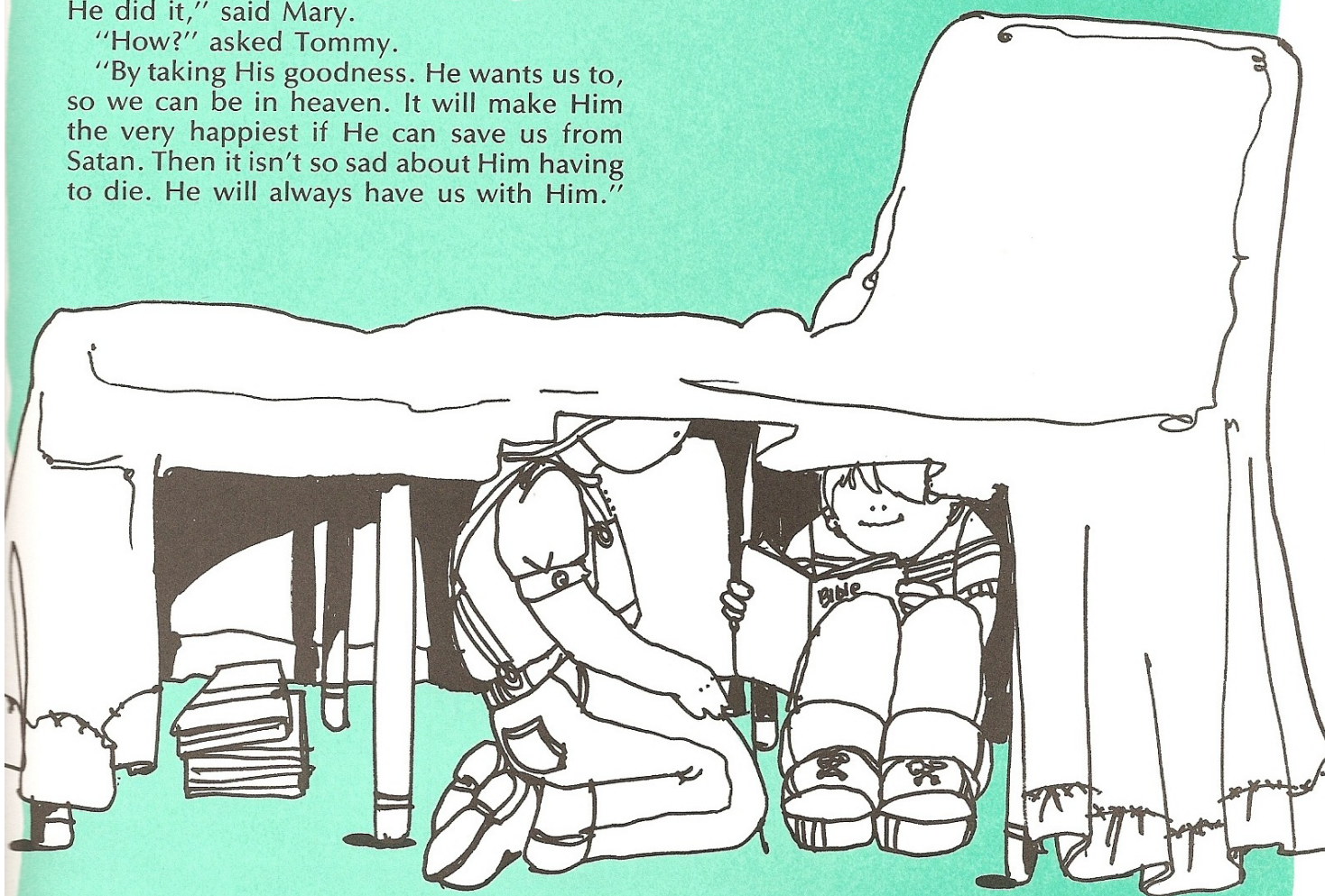
"Well, we can help make Jesus glad that He did it," said Mary.

Both look good to you.

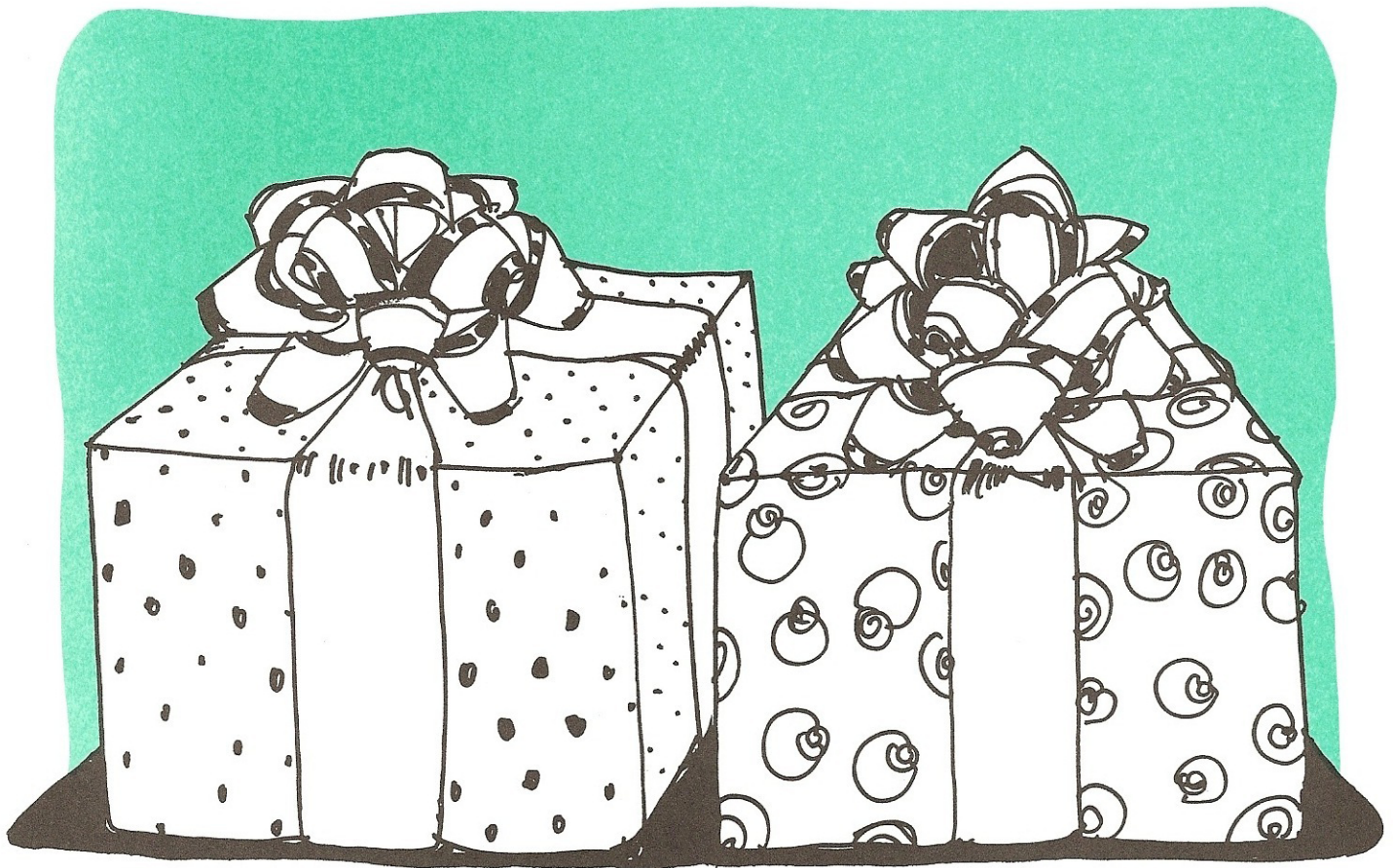
But one of them has a new Sabbath outfit inside.


The other has some old greasy rags inside!

Tommy knocked on Mary's door. This was a special day.

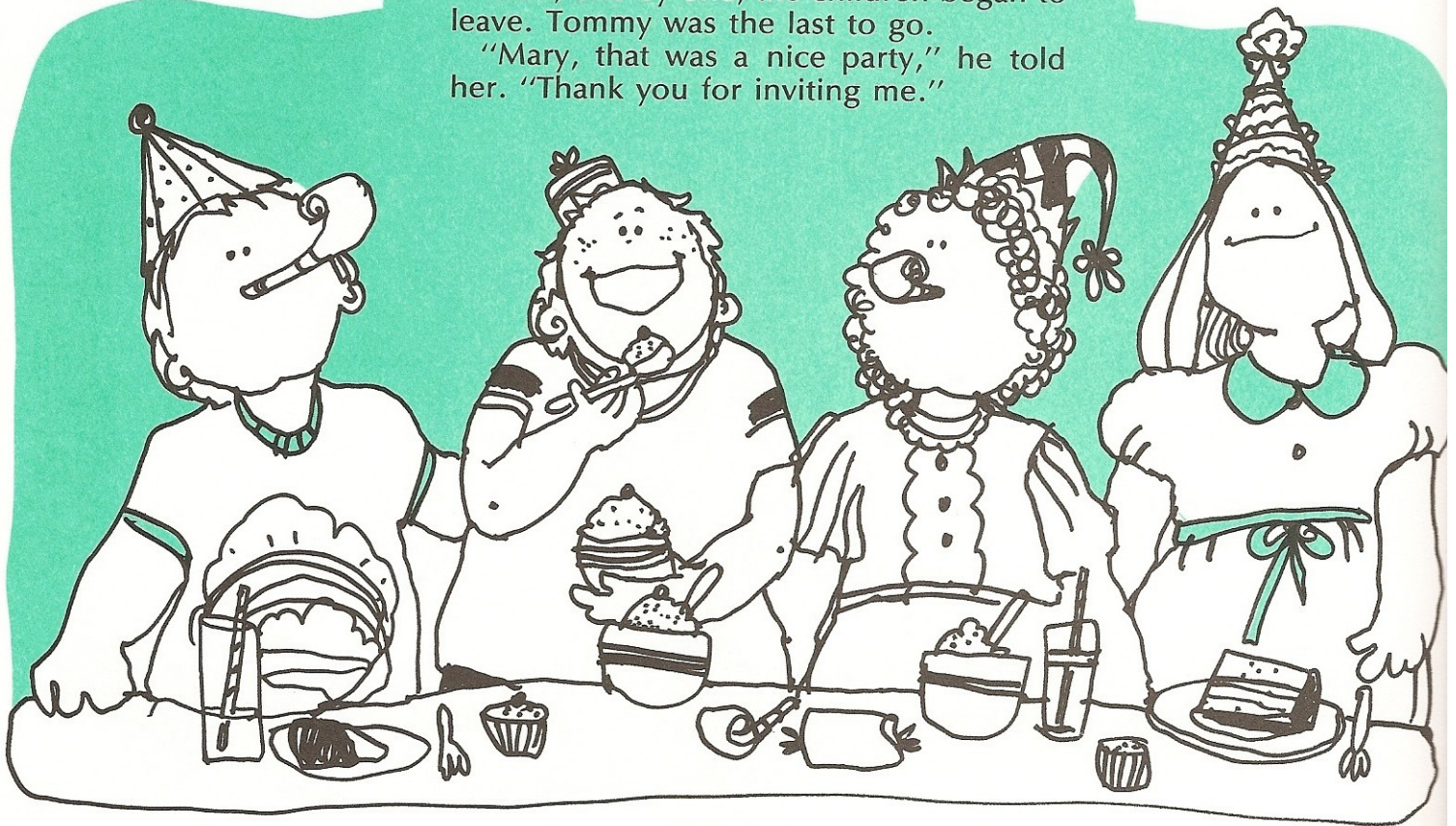
"Happy birthday, dear Mary," he sang when she opened the door. He handed her a present.

Oh, dear! thought Mary. Now Tommy will be angry.

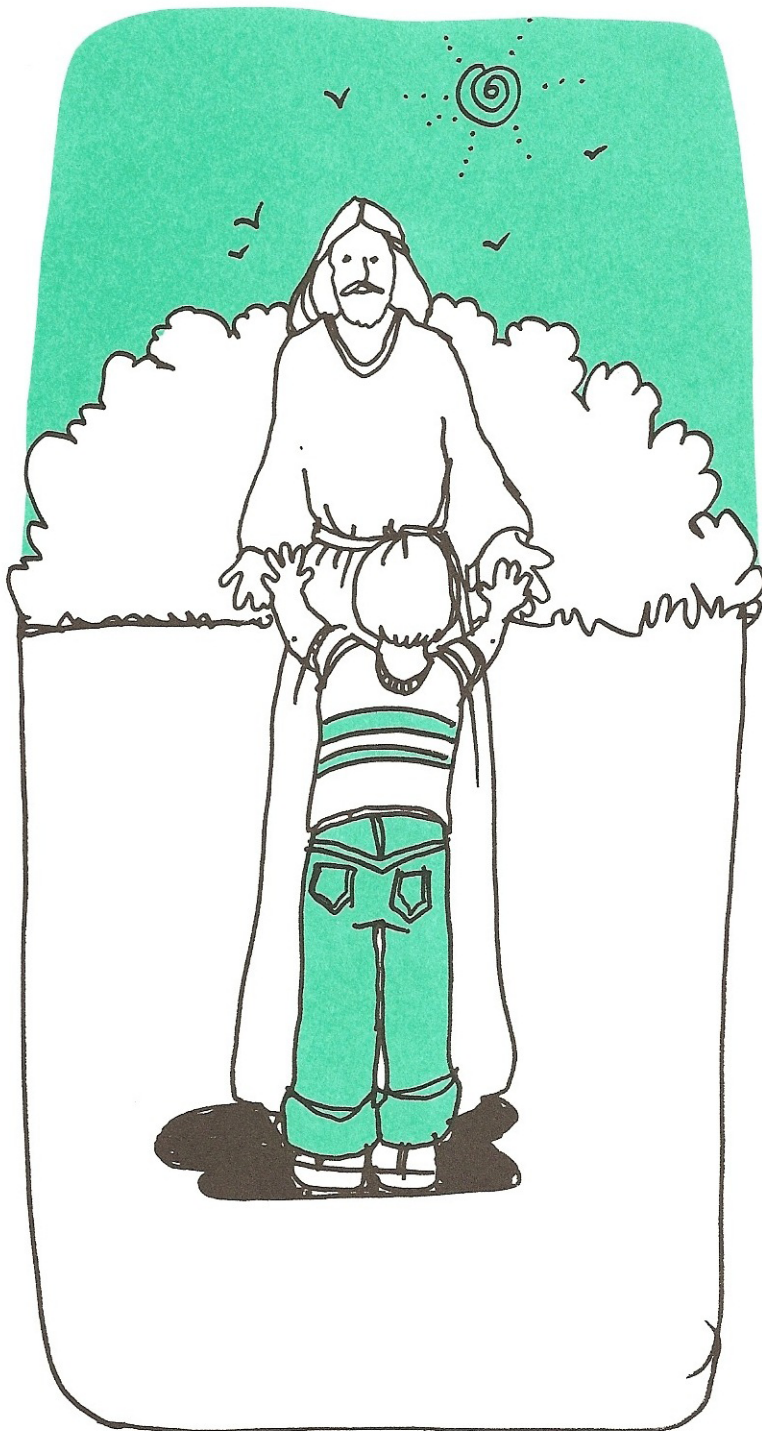
But Tommy only got up, patted the puppy and said, "I'm sorry, doggy. You'd better be more careful from now on. You might get hurt!"

A NEW HEART FOR YOU

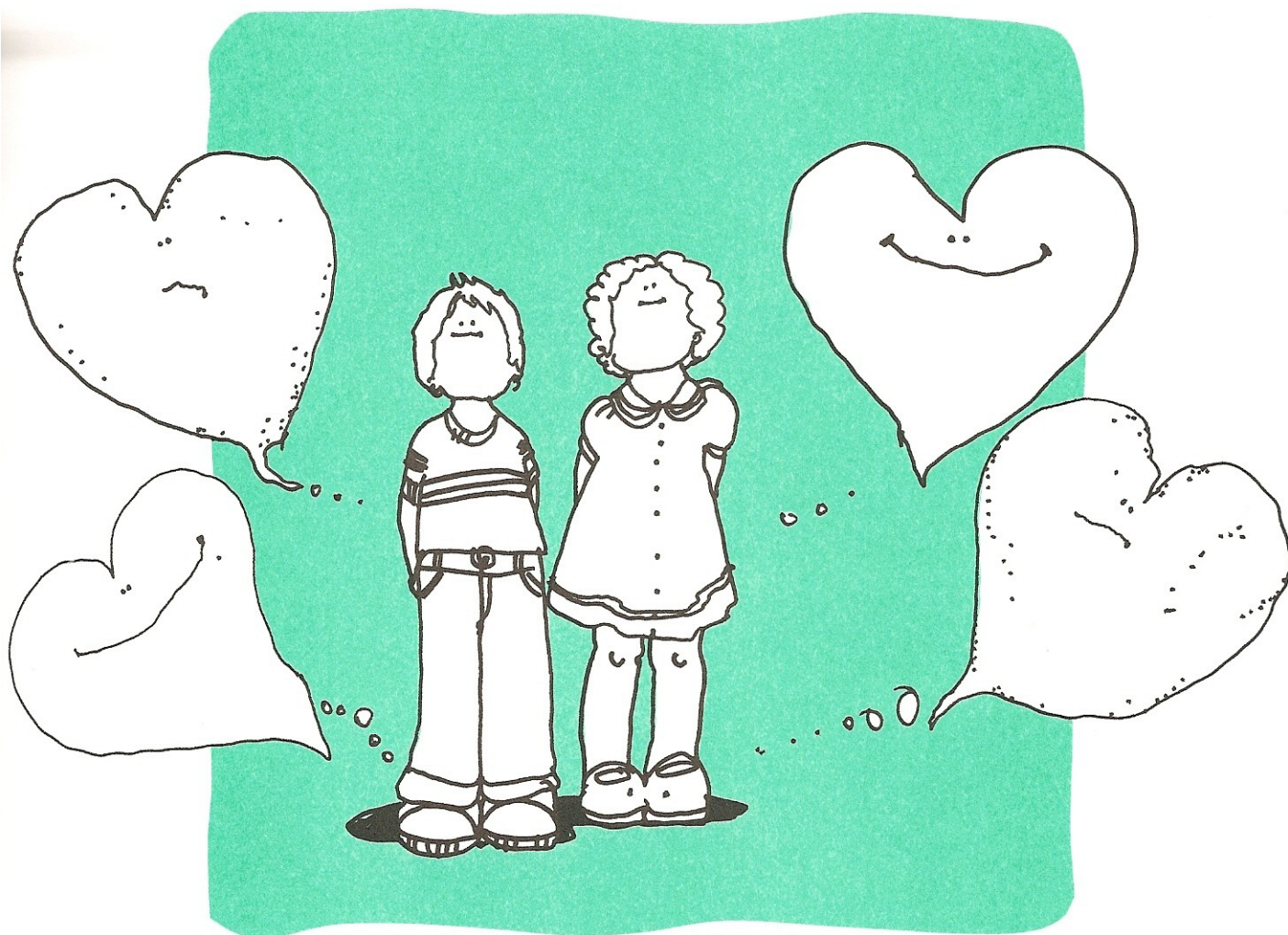
